## **Teaching Notes**

The goal of RL.6.9 is for students to compare and contrast texts in different forms or genres (e.g., stories and poems; historical novels and fantasy stories) in terms of their approaches to similar themes and topics. The following information pertains to how teachers can use this mini-module in a classroom.

## **Activities**

1. Make a chart showing several of the conventions associated with each of the fiction and nonfiction genres listed in the first table included in the Exploring the Standard section of the module. Here is an example of what this chart might look like:

2. Provide students with a common literary archetype in two different genres. Direct students to work in groups to compare and contrast how the archetype is developed within each text and how the genre influences the development of the text. How is the development similar within the two genres? How is the development specific to the constraints of the genre? Example: Examine the villains in a contemporary adventure novel and a historical adventure novel or the villains in realistic fiction and in a nonfiction novel.
