- 6 GENTLEWOMAN. Neither to you nor any one; having no witness to confirm my speech. Lo you, here she comes!

[Enter Lady Macbeth, with a taper.]

- 7 This is her very guise; and, upon my life, fast asleep. Observe her; stand close.
- 8 DOCTOR. How came she by that light?
- 9 GENTLEWOMAN. Why, it stood by her: she has light by her continually; 'tis her command.
- 10 DOCTOR. You see, her eyes are open.
- 11 GENTLEWOMAN. Ay, but their sense is shut.
- 12 DOCTOR. What is it she does now? Look how she rubs her hands.
